The Season of Lent

Today is the first Sunday in the season of Lent, when we are invited to examine the roots of our Christian discipleship and identify Jesus' journey to the cross. The early Sundays are a wilderness time, an opportunity to go deep into our hearts and the souls of our communities, to recognize the depth of our estrangement from God, and to begin to put things right. We observe the tradition of removing Alleluias or flowers in the Sanctuary during Lent: these will return with a burst of joy on Easter Day.

Christ in the Wilderness, Moretto da Brescia (c. 1515-1520)

The gospel lesson for the first Sunday in Lent describes the fasting and temptation of Jesus in the wilderness. Our bulletin cover art today depicts a fatigued and famished Christ sitting pensively on a rocky terrain punctuated by clefts. Two beech trees are planted in the center. The first is dead and dry while the second, fresh with green leaves, leans towards Jesus offering shelter. As Jesus dwells in solitude, a variety of 'wild' creatures attend him. Each animal is turned towards Jesus bending low, some in submission and others in adoration, which connotes Christ victory over sin and temptation.

The raven perched on the rocks stands for unrest, indifference and ill-fortune. Next to the raven lies a dove in flight, a symbol of the Holy Spirit. The dove in the wilderness emphasizes and reassures us of the presence of God in our lives even in the midst of trials and temptations. The bird next to it on the twig of the parched tree is the goldfinch, which represents victory over death.

Comprising the second group of beasts and birds is the crane, the pelican and the stag. According to medieval bestiaries, cranes are said to sleep together in a group, choosing one among them to keep watch. In order to keep alert and avoid the temptation of sleep, the crane keeping watch drops stones on its own foot, exemplifying its loyalty and faithfulness. Bending low by its side is the pelican, which was believed to wound itself in order to feed its young with its own blood. It liturgically expresses Christ sacrificing himself for humanity and thus becomes a symbol of atonement. The stag nearby stands for purity in times of persecution.

The next band of beasts are the wily and the crafty ones – the fox, the basilisk, the bear, and the adder. Thanks to its ever-scheming nature, the fox is the perfect symbol for the devil who is always on the prowl to strike those who succumb. On its right is the mythical creature, the basilisk, acclaimed as the king of the serpents. The bear stooping before Jesus symbolizes evil. The adder, right in front of the bear, is a serpent with a deadly bite. Representing ardent sin, it is often depicted crushed by the feet of Jesus.

The last group consists of the black bird, known for its enticing song; the jay, symbolic of gossip; the phoenix, a reminder of the resurrection; and the lion, known for alertness and watchfulness. Thus through their appealing allegories the beasts and birds bring out the essence of the Gospel narrative and the substance of art.

During the season of Lent, the crosses carried in our processions and on the altar are draped in purple, the color of repentance and preparation. The crosses will remained draped from Ash Wednesday to Palm Sunday. On Palm Sunday, the cloth will change to red, and will remain through Maundy Thursday in preparation for Jesus's crucifixion. On Good Friday, the crosses will be draped in black, symbolizing Jesus' earthly death. On Easter Sunday, the crosses will be uncovered or draped in white, in celebration of the resurrection.

Lent, Passion, and Easter are the only times the crosses are draped in the liturgical year. This is to remind us of the redemptive purpose of Jesus' suffering (purple), crucifixion (red), death (black), and resurrection (white), which these liturgical seasons commemorate. The rest of the year the cross is uncovered to assure us that Jesus is risen.





THE GREAT LITANY

Adapted from BCP - Church of Ireland Musical Setting: Richard Phillips (b. 1959)

The Great Litany is an intercessory prayer including various petitions with fixed responses by the congregation. It is the first recorded English-language rite – prepared by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer, first published in 1544, and printed in the 1549 Book of Common Prayer. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, included The Great Litany in his Sunday Service for the Methodists of North America. This prayer of supplication is broadly inclusive. Because of its penitential tone, The Great Litany is especially appropriate during Lent.

The clergy will speak each petition, followed by a sung response. The congregation is encouraged to join in singing each response.

GENERAL PETITIONS

God the Father, creator of heaven and earth,



God the Son, Redeemer of the world,

Have mercy upon us.

God the Holy Spirit, giver of life,

Have mercy upon us.

Holy, blessed, and glorious Trinity, three persons in one God,

Have mercy upon us.

Save us, good Lord, from all sin and wickedness, from pride, hypocrisy and conceit, from envy, hatred and malice, and all uncharitableness,

Bless and keep all your people,


Hear us, good Lord.


